## Redefining How I see Jesus.

2.4.18

Mark Series

Mark 3:20-35 (NIV)

- <sup>20</sup> Then Jesus entered a house, and again a crowd gathered, so that he and his disciples were not even able to eat. <sup>21</sup> When his family heard about this, they went to take charge of him, for they said, "He is out of his mind."
- <sup>22</sup> And the teachers of the law who came down from Jerusalem said, "He is possessed by Beelzebul! By the prince of demons he is driving out demons."
- <sup>23</sup> So Jesus called them over to him and began to speak to them in parables: "How can Satan drive out Satan? <sup>24</sup> If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. <sup>25</sup> If a house is divided against itself, that house cannot stand. <sup>26</sup> And if Satan opposes himself and is divided, he cannot stand; his end has come. <sup>27</sup> In fact, no one can enter a strong man's house without first tying him up. Then he can plunder the strong man's house. <sup>28</sup> Truly I tell you, people can be forgiven all their sins and every slander they utter, <sup>29</sup> but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit will never be forgiven; they are guilty of an eternal sin."
  - <sup>30</sup> He said this because they were saying, "He has an impure spirit."
- $^{31}$  Then Jesus' mother and brothers arrived. Standing outside, they sent someone in to call him.  $^{32}$  A crowd was sitting around him, and they told him, "Your mother and brothers are outside looking for you."
  - 33 "Who are my mother and my brothers?" he asked.
- <sup>34</sup> Then he looked at those seated in a circle around him and said, "Here are my mother and my brothers! <sup>35</sup> Whoever does God's will is my brother and sister and mother."

## 1. Our perspective matters.

- A. The older I get the more I am learning that my perspective matters.
  - 1. Think with me about this cup.
    - a. Is it half full or half-empty?

- b. That depends on what is in it.
- c. How do I view this if it is the nasty medicine that has to be drunk?
- d. Or if this is the last of my drinking water for the rest of the day?
- e. How do I view this if this is my favorite drink?
- 2. I'm learning that the way I see myself and the world makes a big difference.
  - a. As we have gone through this building project, I've had to watch my perspective.
    - 1. When I'm tired or stressed, I've had to remind myself that this is an honor to be getting to do something like this.
    - 2. Not every church or every pastor will be part of a move of God like this.
  - b. This attitude is much healthier than complaining or grumbling.
    - 1. And it applies to whatever stage of life we are in.
    - 2. How you view your marriage, your children, your job, and your current struggles or opportunities are very important.
    - 3. And, usually, <u>our attitude and perspective have a</u> <u>direct connection to our view of Jesus.</u>
- B. How we view situations and circumstances determine if we will grow or fail.
  - 1. The difference between a trial and a temptation is the motive behind it.
    - a. Tests are designed to bring out the best in us.
    - b. Temptations are designed to lead us to failure.

- c. God will never tempt us, but he will test us.
- 2. The right perspective will help foster the right attitude.
  - a. The right attitudes create the proper emotions.
  - b. The proper emotions will result in the correct action.
- 3. When our perspectives and views are messed up, our actions will be too.
- C. Today's passage features 3 groups of people.
  - 1. All of them, to varying degrees, have the wrong view of Jesus.
  - 2. The crowd sees Jesus as someone to meet their needs.
  - 3. The teachers of the law saw Jesus as a fake, fraud, and source of evil.
  - 4. Jesus' family saw Jesus as someone to control and claim as their own.
  - 5. The root of the problem for all three groups lays in their view of Jesus.
  - 6. Today, the central theme is this: If our perspective on Jesus is right, our attitude and actions will be right as well.
  - 7. Let's talk about this passage in Mark 3.
- 2. The source of Jesus' power is being questioned.
  - A. First, Jesus' family questions Jesus' power and actions.
    - 1. This is understandable.
      - a. Jesus grew up with them.
      - b. They knew his birth was special.
      - c. But they didn't understand where this would lead him.

- 2. Verse 20 says that Jesus' family went to seize him because they thought He was out of his mind.
  - a. They literally thought Jesus had gone crazy.
  - b. Only a crazy man would be surrounded by crowds all the time.
  - c. Only a crazy man would do miracles, and heal the sick, and act like He was Israel's Messiah.
  - d. Jesus must have problems, his family thought.
  - e. They were embarrassed by Jesus and wanted him to stop ruining the family name.
  - f. Their view and perspective of Jesus was messed up and would stay that way until after Jesus' death and resurrection.
- 3. It needs to be noted that Jesus' family misunderstood Him.
  - a. Their intent was not malicious.
  - b. They believed they were doing what was best for Jesus and the family.
  - c. They acted in ignorance, and Jesus was willing to forgive them.
- B. But the religious teachers and scribes went much further.
  - 1. They accused Jesus of being possessed by Beelzebul.
    - a. Beelzebul, interestingly, is not the devil.
    - b. Beelzebul is a reference to the prince of demons, a demon that is under the authority of Satan.
    - c. The teachers weren't accusing Jesus of being Satan, they were accusing him of working for Satan.
    - d. They literally were saying that Jesus could do all of these miracles because he worked for Satan.

- 2. The Pharisees knew what they were doing was wrong.
  - a. They knew that the OT had said the coming Messiah would heal the sick, restore sight to the blind, and raise the dead.
  - b. They saw the incredible work that Jesus was doing.
  - c. Yet, instead of giving God glory they gave it to the devil.
- 3. This is the essence of the Blasphemy of the Holy Spirit
  - a. I grew up knowing Jesus would forgive all my sins.
    - 1. EXCEPT for the Blasphemy of the Holy Spirit.
    - 2. And I lived in fear that I had committed this sin.
    - 3. When you grow up a preacher's kid, you don't fear the boogie monster, you fear the unpardonable sin.
  - b. What is the Blasphemy of the Holy Spirit?
    - 1. "To hate God so much that you willfully attribute something that is unmistakably of God and give the credit to Satan."
    - 2. There are several key components to this:
      - a. Your motive must be hate, not ignorance.
      - b. You knowingly know that something IS the unmistakable work of God.
      - c. And you willfully and purposefully give the credit due to God/Holy Spirit and give it to the spirit of Satan.
  - c. Clearly, what Jesus was doing He was doing through the power of the Holy Spirit.
    - 1. His family didn't grasp this, but the Pharisees did.

- 2. This is why Jesus gently taught his family, yet he threatened the Pharisees.
- 4. The reason why I am explaining this today is to reassure you that you have not committed the unpardonable sin.
  - a. Many of us will have moments in our lives where we wonder if God can forgive me.
  - b. Maybe you are afraid that you have blasphemed the Holy Spirit and won't go to heaven.
  - c. There are people who have blasphemed the Holy Spirit, but your willingness to be here today tells me that none of you have.
- C. How does this apply to me if I don't really have to worry about the blasphemy of the Holy Spirit?
  - 1. Let's return back to the idea of perspective.
  - 2. How I view situations or people radically effects my life.
  - 3. Let's look at 3 wrong ways to see Jesus and then 3 ingredients to a healthy view of Jesus.
- 3. 3 Wrong ways to see Jesus.
  - A. I see Jesus as someone to meet my needs. (crowd)
    - 1. One of the greatest dangers for American Christians is to view Jesus as a spiritual slot machine or as a wish-granting genie.
      - a. We only pray when we want something.
      - b. And we want immediate, and instant gratification.
    - 2. This is how the crowds saw Jesus.
      - a. They had hurts, Jesus could heal, so they chased after Him for his miracle power.
      - b. This is ok and appropriate for a while.

- c. But basing any kind of relationship on what you can get out of it is dangerous and demeaning.
- 3. This is what the crowds had done.
  - a. When Jesus starts talking about himself being crucified, people start leaving.
  - b. People who are in the relationship only for what they can get out of it will leave when things get tough.
  - c. As we will see later in Jesus' parables, many people fall into this category.
- B. **Wrong**: I see Jesus as a fake, fraud, or source of evil. (religious leaders)
  - 1. The Pharisees didn't like Jesus, what He was doing, or the threat to their hold on the people.
    - a. When a person' position or stability is threatened, most will try to discredit the threat.
    - b. This is exactly what these leaders tried to do.
    - c. The Pharisees began to accuse Jesus of working for demons.
  - 2. Jesus showed them how ridiculous this was.
    - a. "A house divided against itself cannot stand..."
    - b. Abraham Lincoln said this during the Civil War but Jesus said it first.
    - c. It didn't make sense for "Satan to cast out Satan..."
    - d. But when people are trying to discredit someone, the lies don't often make sense.
  - 3. The Pharisees' view of Jesus threatened their eternity.
    - a. The crowds didn't have a great view.

- b. But Jesus showed them great compassion because they didn't know better and because they were in need.
- c. The Pharisees' view of Jesus was a complete rejection of the Son of God.
- d. I'm afraid that many in our culture today are willfully rejecting Jesus and His power.
  - 1. They call him a fake, a fraud, or a myth.
  - 2. This view of Jesus is very dangerous.
  - 3. So is the next one.
- C. Wrong: I see Jesus as someone to control and lay claim too. (Jesus' family).

Mark 3:31-35 (NIV)

- <sup>31</sup> Then Jesus' mother and brothers arrived. Standing outside, they sent someone in to call him. <sup>32</sup> A crowd was sitting around him, and they told him, "Your mother and brothers are outside looking for you."
- 33 "Who are my mother and my brothers?" he asked.
- <sup>34</sup> Then he looked at those seated in a circle around him and said, "Here are my mother and my brothers! <sup>35</sup> Whoever does God's will is my brother and sister and mother."
  - 1. Jesus' family assumed that blood was thicker than water.
    - a. Because they were family, they could expect Jesus to do what they wanted, when they wanted.
    - b. They wanted to get ahead of the crowds and those waiting for Jesus on the basis that "they were family".
  - 2. Jesus then rocked their world.
    - a. In the new Kingdom, it wasn't blood that brought people into the family of God.
    - b. It was their willingness to do the will of God that made them family.

- c. It isn't where you are from, how much money, or who your family is that matters in the Kingdom.
- d. What matters is your view of who Jesus is.
- e. And when you see Jesus as the Son of God, born of a virgin, who lived a sinless life, died upon the cross, rose from the dead, and will soon return as King of the World....
- f. Then you can't help but do the will of God!
- g. And that makes you family with Jesus.

We have looked at 3 wrong ways to see Jesus. Let's look 3 right ways...

## 4. I see Jesus....

- A. I see Jesus as a willing Savior who satisfies my needs. Vs. 20
  - 1. Jesus isn't a wish-granting genie.
    - a. But he isn't without power or compassion.
    - b. Jesus is willing to:
      - 1. Heal the sick.
      - 2. Forgive the sinner.
      - 3. Restore the prodigal.
      - 4. And answer your prayers.
- 2. We don't have to fear to come to Jesus and to ask for his help.
  - a. He is willing to meet my needs.
  - b. He loves us and has promised to supply all of our needs.
  - 3. We can ask God for help in time in need because we see Jesus as our loving Savior.
    - a. The difference between seeing Jesus as Savior and viewing him as a genie in a bottle is relationship.

- b. I can ask for anything, in Jesus' name, because He loves me and because I love him.
- c. This is how we should view Jesus.
- B. I see Jesus who is willing to forgive me of my sins. Vs. 28-29
  - 1. There is an old saying that says, "Don't look a gift horse in the mouth."
    - a. Meaning, don't find fault with something that has been received as a gift or favor.
    - b. This is exactly what the religious leaders were doing.
    - <sup>28</sup> Truly I tell you, people can be forgiven all their sins and every slander they utter, <sup>29</sup> but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit will never be forgiven; they are guilty of an eternal sin."
  - 2. It seems like a lot of people today are trying to find fault with their salvation.
    - a. Many question God's choice of the cross.
    - b. Many question their need for a savior.
    - c. Many find fault with how God has chosen to change us, use us, and sanctify us.
    - d. And in the process, they view Jesus as a myth, legend or a fake.
  - 3. But when I look at Jesus, I see the only one who was ever willing to die for my sins and forgive me of my mistakes.
    - a. This view has literally changed my life.
    - b. And when I struggle, or when someone sins against me, I look upon the one who has forgiven me of so much more.
    - c. And that changes my perspective.
- C. Lastly, I see Jesus' desire to make me family. Vs. 35-35
  - 1. Jesus didn't stop with forgiveness.

- a. He made me a full-fledged member of the family.
- b. And he invited me to serve with Him and for Him.
- 2. As I go where Jesus calls, and do what Jesus asks, I count it my privilege.
  - a. When you go to a Chic-fil-a, and thank one of their workers, one of their main responses is: IT's my privilege.
  - b. Not, that's what I'm paid to do.
  - c. Not, that's what I have to do.
  - d. But, that's what I GET to do.
  - e. What's the primary difference between a McDonalds employee and a Chic-Fil-A employee?
  - f. Their perspective.
- 3. When God calls you to something.
  - a. Your family.
  - b. A ministry or vocation.
  - c. You have two options.
  - d. You can focus on yourself or you can focus on Jesus.
  - e. And when you focus on Jesus, there is a far greater reward.
  - f. He makes you family.

## Closing: My view of Jesus is a life or death decision.

- A. This morning, who is Jesus to you?
  - 1. Why are you here?
  - 2. What are you looking for?
  - 3. No matter who you are, your view of Jesus matters.
- B. This morning, the Holy Spirit invites you to see Jesus.

- 1. As your loving Savior.
- 2. As your healer and provider.
- 3. As someone who longs to be in a relationship with you.
- 4. Jesus has done His part, and today it is up to you to make your decision.
