Acts 13:1-4 (CSB)

- **13** Now in the church at Antioch there were prophets and teachers: Barnabas, Simeon who was called Niger, Lucius of Cyrene, Manaen, a close friend of Herod the tetrarch, and Saul.
- ² As they were worshiping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, "Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them."
- ³ Then after they had fasted, prayed, and laid hands on them, they sent them off.
- ⁴ So being sent out by the Holy Spirit, they went down to Seleucia, and from there they sailed to Cyprus.

Today we celebrate the call of God.

- A. In a few minutes, we will eat fish to the glory of God and thank Ben and Brenda for their time here in Licking.
 - 1. But first, I want to invite us into this passage to see how God has not quit calling people.
 - 2. I also want to show us from scripture the role the community of God plays in the calling of God.
- B. When we talk about calling, we often picture it individually.
 - 1. What is God asking ME to do?
 - 2. Where is God equipping ME to serve?
 - 3. Where is God leading ME?

- C. But the calling of God is discovered not only individually with times of personal prayer and fasting but also corporately within the community of God.
 - 1. Your Church family may be more important than you realize.
 - 2. Using Paul, Barnabas, and Ben as examples, I want to show you this relationship between the Spirit, the Church, and the People of God.

1. The passage begins with the church in Antioch.

- A. This church was very influential in the early days of Christianity.
 - 1. Antioch is in the far southern tip of modern-day Turkey.
 - 2. It is 300 miles north of Jerusalem and served as the center of the early Gentile Church.
 - 3. After Jerusalem, it became this hub of missional activity.
 - 4. This is where Paul and Barnabas find themselves in their early ministry.
- B. Notice that Acts calls this group of people the church.
 - 1. The word "church" means a gathering of people for a purpose.
 - 2. Even though it wasn't at first used to describe a gathering of Christians, it soon referred strictly to a group of people gathered together for the express purpose of worshipping Jesus.
- C. Although the church looks different today than it did in Acts 13, I want to express to you the importance of every community, neighborhood, village, and city having groups of believers who gather regularly in Jesus' name.
 - 1. What we do every week on the Lord's Day is not trivial or optional.
 - 2. The gathering of saints and believers is an essential part of Christianity that Jesus uses.
 - 3. This is why we give to missions and hear missionary speakers.

- 4. This is why we bless people to go and serve as we did with Brandon and Kenzie Weddle and now Ben and Brenda Wolf.
- 5. Every community must have access to a Bible-believing church.
- 6. And no, there are not too many churches.
 - a. There may be too many ineffective churches.
 - b. But there are not too many churches, even here in the Bible Belt.
- D. I know the Church isn't perfect, including this one.
 - 1. There are sinners here.
 - 2. There are addicts here.
 - 3. There are people struggling in their marriages, their finances, and life here.
 - a. Not everyone who attends will become your life-long friend.
 - b. Not everyone who comes through these doors has it all together.
 - c. Every single one of us is in the middle of our sanctification.
 - 4. It has ALWAYS been this way, as Scripture shows us.
 - a. The letters to the Corinthians perfectly demonstrate that the Church has never been perfect.
 - b. Remember, the only thing perfect is Jesus.
 - 5. The people's imperfection is not a reason to stop gathering with other believers.

2. What was the Church doing?

A. There was the ministry of prophets and teachers.

- 1. Very simply, Prophesying tells me that they were receiving insight and direction from the Lord through the ministry of the Holy Spirit.
- 2. We don't know much about what the Lord was saying through the ministry of prophecy at Antioch.
 - a. But we do know that the Lord was speaking, and the people were listening.
 - b. Remember, the New Testament prophets were ordinary people like us.
 - c. They were not perfect, sometimes they got it wrong (which is what much of Paul's teaching in 1 Corinthians is about), and I'm sure it got uncomfortable at times.
- 3. But the people were engaged with God to a degree that makes many of us uncomfortable.
 - a. One of the things I love about this church is you all seem to thrive when I preach uncomfortable, blue jean, sermons.
 - b. I love that, and I hope that does not change.
 - c. But I long for the day when there is a holy nervousness about entering into worship, giving in the offering, and praying at the altar.
 - d. I long for the day when we are convinced that all of us will be challenged and changed at each moment of the service.
- B. The Church in Antioch was being taught.
 - 1. They were learning, growing, and being discipled by those with gifts of teaching.
 - 2. Spiritual gifts, like prophecy, are dangerous when people are not teachable.
 - 3. But the church in Antioch was a place where teaching and growing could happen.

- C. The Church was Fasting and Worshipping.
 - 1. Worshipping is surely connected to both prayer and singing.
 - a. The Church has always prayed and sang together.
 - b. And they didn't pray silently to themselves but prayed aloud.
 - c. Prayer and singing were community activities.
 - 2. They were also fasting.
 - a. They could have been fasting till sundown.
 - b. They could have been engaged in fasting two days a week.
 - c. They might have been fasting food for a longer period of time.
 - d. And even though there are times when we are to fast and not brag about it, fasting here was a church-wide community event.
 - 3. It is significant that we see that one of the earliest forms of worship for Christians included fasting.
 - a. Fasting is the withholding of food and sometimes water for the purpose of dedicating time, energy, and discomfort to prayer and worship.
 - 1. A similar practice of married couples abstaining from sex for a short time is similar but not called fasting.
 - 2. Also, I submit to you that the popular "Daniel Fast" is misleading because Daniel wasn't fasting; it was his normal diet.
 - 3. We might call abstaining from media, TV, or other things "fasting," but biblically, fasting is always food and water.

- b. Furthermore, there is no speed fasting.
- c. Fasting is the prolonged denial of earthly bread so that we might develop an appetite for the Bread of Life.
- d. "Man does not live on bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord (Deut. 8:3, Matt 4:4).
- D. All of this is happening communally.
 - 1. They were not isolating themselves but joining themselves with others.
 - 2. Together, they were blessing the Lord and building each other up through the ministry of prophecy, teaching, worship, and fasting.
 - 3. It was within this context that the Spirit spoke to them about Paul and Barnabas.

3. The Spirit initiated the Call.

- A. Paul and Barnabas were already active within the congregation.
 - 1. They were already serving, working, and doing ministry.
 - 2. In other words, they were known by the believers and had proven faithful and trustworthy.
 - 3. Where they were was a good, God-honoring place.
- B. But the Spirit set them apart for something different.
 - 1. Through the ministry of the body, the prophets, the Spirit said to set them apart.
 - a. I have often read this, thinking it was an audible supernatural voice.
 - b. But it doesn't have to be.
 - c. How does the Lord speak?

- d. Does He not speak through the spiritual gifts that He has placed within the community?
- 2. Likely, while they were gathered, the Lord used one or several of the prophets to say, "Set apart for me, Paul and Barnabas."
 - a. The people's response was obedience coupled with more prayer and fasting.
 - b. Perhaps they were confirming the word of the Lord through prayer and fasting.
 - c. They weren't hesitant, but they also were not rash.
 - d. They soaked themselves, Paul and Barnabas, in prayer and fasting, for what God was calling them to was too important.
- C. Good advice here: Before making decisions, have you prayed?
 - 1. And not 30-second prayers.
 - 2. Do you sense something coming up?
 - 3. If so, have you fasted?
 - 4. Because the time to fast is BEFORE you have to make a decision.
 - a. Sometimes, we try to delegate this by asking others what we should do.
 - b. We haven't been praying, fasting, or worshipping, so we go to someone who has and hope they get a word for us.
 - c. But this is not healthy.
 - d. The WHOLE body shares in the responsibility to be spiritually ready for the ministry of the Holy Spirit.
- D. I love how the whole community, not just the leaders, was involved in the prayer and fasting.
 - 1. Can I suggest to you that this is something ALL of us can do better?

- a. What could happen if we ALL spent time each week in specific prayer and fasting?
- b. Not just in the building but throughout the week.
- c. Starting tomorrow night, we will meet for prayer from 630 till about 730, Monday-Wednesday.
- d. What if you decided now to attend as many of these prayer nights as possible?
- e. What if you decided not to eat anything until AFTER the prayer service each night?
- f. What kind of difference would it make if we ALL prayed and fasted?
- 2. Would we make better decisions?
 - a. Would the worship time be more powerful?
 - b. Would the preaching have more impact?
 - c. Would we know the Lord's will more clearly?
- 3. It's easy to talk about fasting when we are getting ready to eat fish.
 - a. Can I challenge you to try fasting a meal or a day a week?
 - b. Can I ask you to pray for Sunday service every Saturday night before you go to bed?
 - 1. If I could ask you to start just one thing in the new year, it would be to pray for me, the church, and yourself EVERY Saturday night in 2024.
 - 2. That's 52 times.
- 4. Prayer, fasting, and worship were the activities of ALL the Church, not a select few.

- 4. The sending of Paul and Barnabas was a community event.
 - A. As the believers in Antioch blessed them, they participated in the future ministry that happened elsewhere.
 - 1. It says they laid hands upon them.
 - 2. This is a sign and symbol of the community blessing upon them.
 - 3. It is a symbol of ordination, that Paul and Barnabas might go within the power of the Lord and the blessing of the people.
 - B. A calling like Paul and Barnabas' needed a special blessing.
 - 1. They had received a call to devote themselves to the work of the Lord and to leave what had become home.
 - 2. They were to leave all behind and to go wherever the Lord should lead.
 - 3. And as Paul and Barnabas preached, planted churches, healed the sick, and cast out demons, the Church in Antioch was blessed because of them too.
 - 4. And a side note, they didn't break up simply because Paul and Barnabas left.
 - 5. One of my greatest concerns is that when it is my time to move you, so many of you do the same.
 - C. The Call to ministry is a community event.
 - 1. Ben and Brenda believed that they would pastor in this area someday.
 - 2. They probably hadn't imagined it would take 7 years, but it has.
 - 3. And in the meantime, this community of believers has had a shaping function that I believe has prepared them to minister in Norwood.
 - a. Ben, you weren't ready to pastor a country church when I first met you.

- b. But I am firmly convinced that this is the Lord's timing and plan.
- c. Today, it seems good to us and the Holy Spirit to send you with our blessing and love to Norwood.

Close: Today, we participate in the call of the Spirit for Ben and Brenda to move to Norwood.

- A. I'm proud of them both as they jump fully into this new ministry endeavor.
 - 1. Today, in just a moment, we are going to lay hands upon Ben and Brenda and bless them.
 - 2. Your kids will be coming back to you in a few minutes.
- B. We are laying hands upon them to express a few things:
 - 1. First, we are recognizing that this move is the will of God.
 - 2. Second, we are expressing that we are giving the Lord from our best.
 - 3. Third, we are expressing excitement that part of the DNA and Culture of Licking A/G will be married to the church at Norwood.
